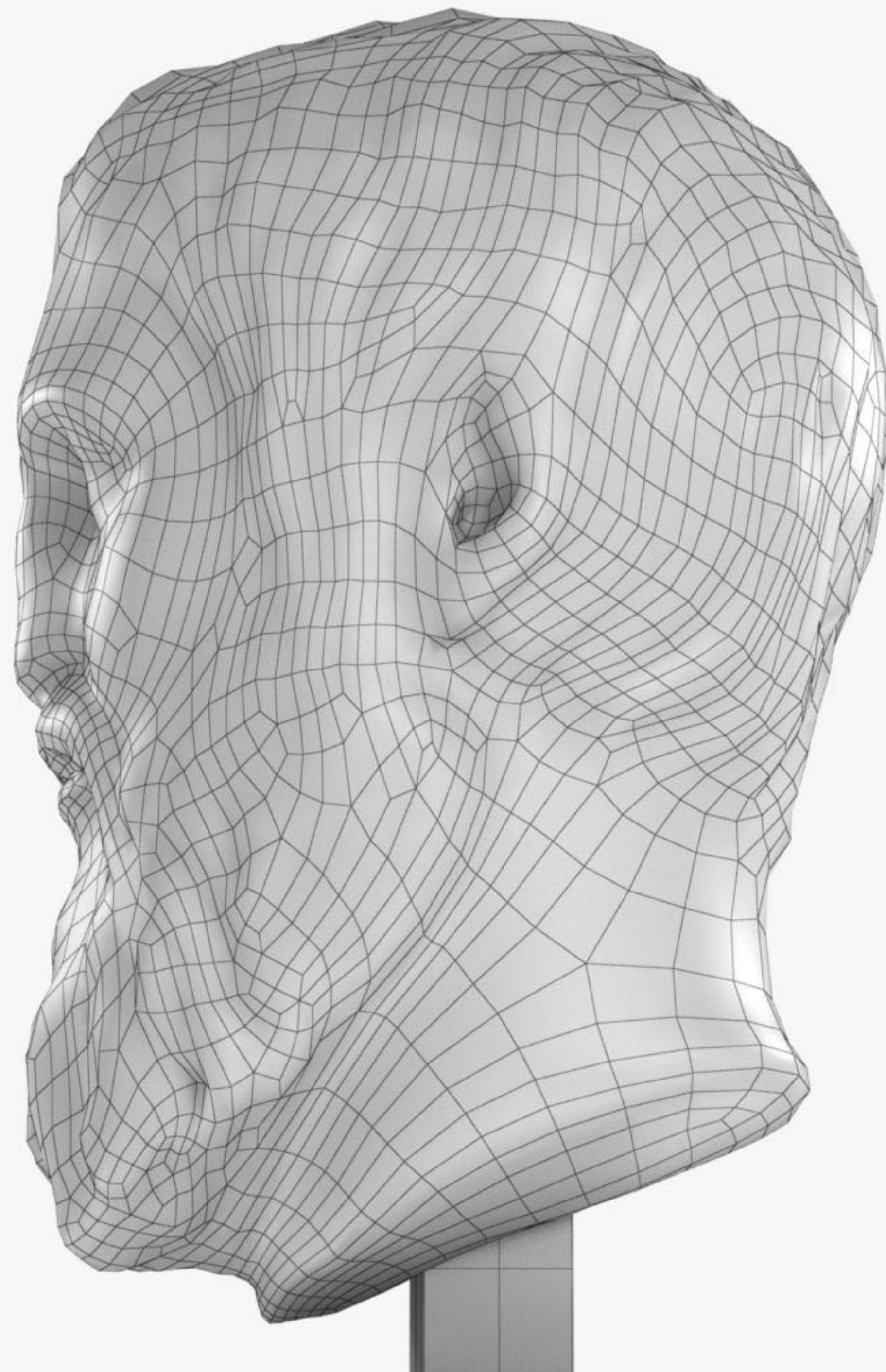


Figure 4a: Laying an undersea cable in Cape Town, South Africa, 1889 (E2E Consulting, 2015).

Essentialism

„is most commonly understood as a belief in the real, true essence of things, the invariable and fixed properties which define the ‘whatness’ of a given entity ... Importantly, essentialism is typically defined in opposition to difference ... The opposition is a helpful one in that it reminds us that a complex system of cultural, social, psychical, and historical differences, and not a set of pre-existent human essences, position and constitute the subject. However, the binary articulation of essentialism and difference can also be restrictive, even obfuscating, in that it allows us to ignore or deny the differences within essentialism“

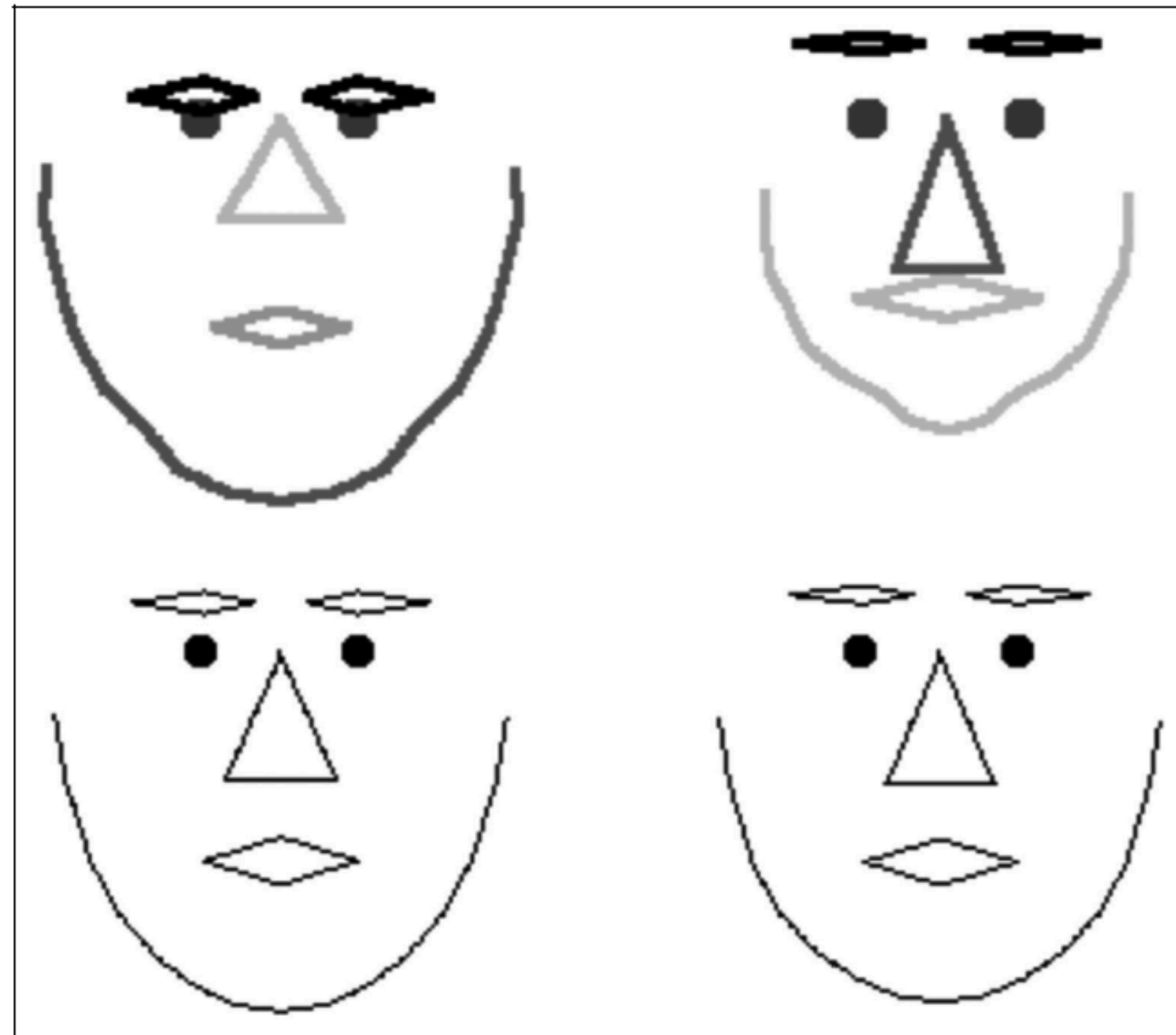


Figure 1. Feature weights for gender classification from Brunelli and Poggio (1992).

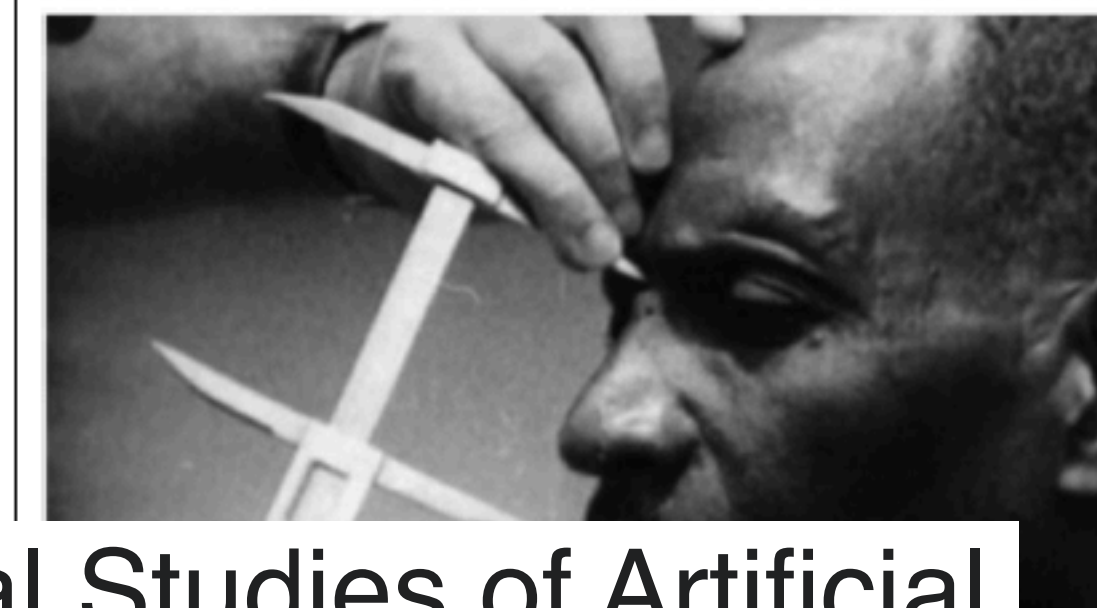
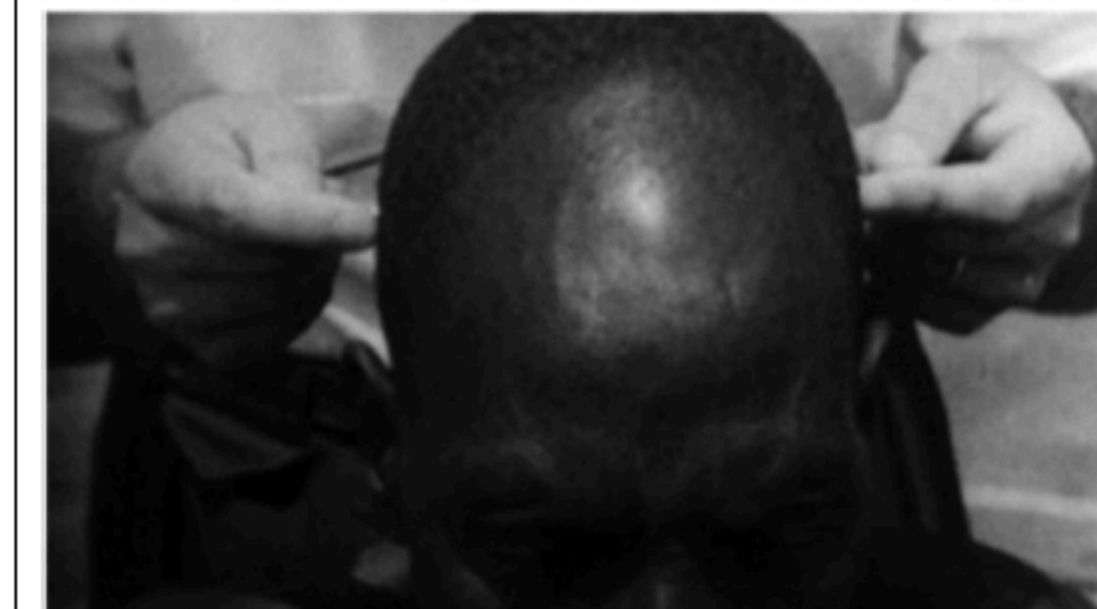


Figure 3. Left: Belgium scientists taking physiological measurements. Photos from Curtis (2011). Right: Silhouettes of racial profiles from Fu et al. (2014), stating: "From left to right: African-American (Male/Female), Asian (Male/Female), Caucasian American (Male/Female)." The figure originally published in Davidenko (2007).

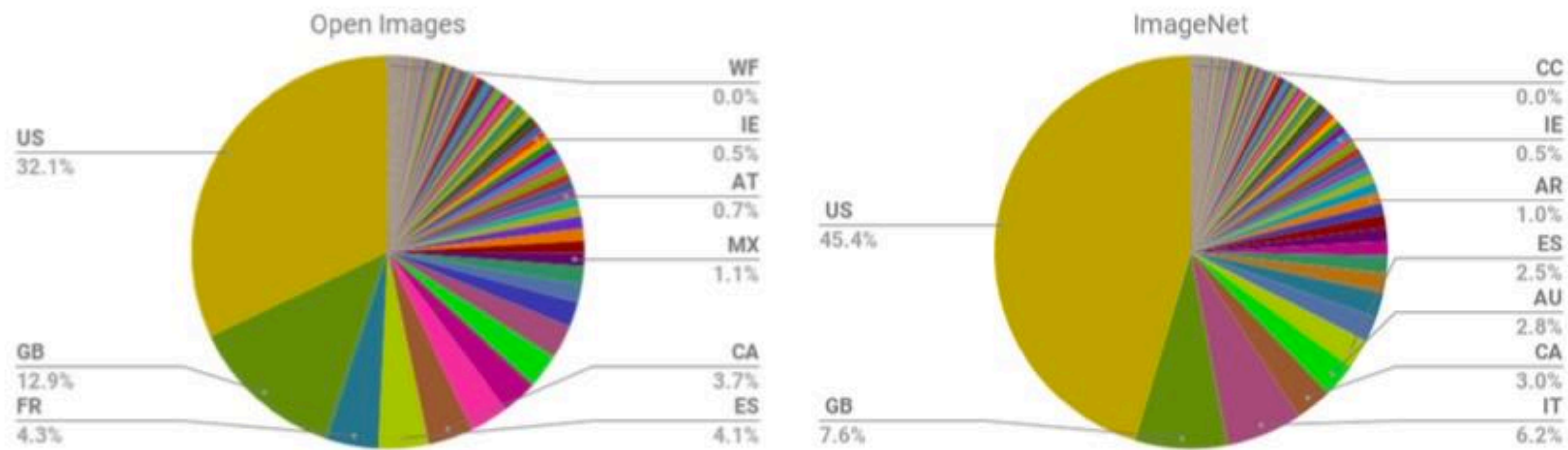


Figure 1: Fraction of Open Images and ImageNet images from each country. In both data sets, top represented locations include the US and Great Britain. Countries are represented by their two-letter ISO country codes.
